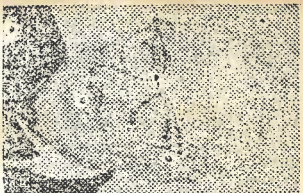

Notes by Louis Untermeyer

This was the year of problems, portents—and prohibition. Prohibition was the most hotly contested and most evaded issue in the United States. Mrs. Mabel Willebrandt, Assistant U. S. Attorney General in charge of prohibition enforcement, told a Senate committee that the Volstead Act not only could be enforced but *was* being enforced with increasing success. Nevertheless, New Year's Eve was one of the "wettest" in history. Holiday liquor killed 26 in New York City alone; Federal Prohibition Agents raided the County Clerk's office in Chicago and captured a cache of bottled booze; bootleggers shot to death Mayor Jeff Stone near Herrin, Illinois; U. S. Attorney E. R. Buckner told the Senate probers at Washington that almost two hundred million Volstead law violators were widely poll on prohibition showed a majority of 5 to 1 either for repeal or modification. There were other troubles at home. The hard

owned by 135 companies. An inquiry by the New York City Health Department revealed that there had been milk bootlegging, that graft in the last two years had passed the million dollar mark, and that 40% of all loose milk delivered in the city had been skimmed or watered.

A tropical hurricane from the ocean swept the east coast of Florida into Alabama and Mississippi. The casualties were large: 372 killed; 6,261 hurt; 17,884 families temporarily made homeless. In the Bahamas 4,000 were made homeless, and hurricanes were blown to pieces all along the Gulf Coast. Storms flooded 36,000 acres in Iowa, doing \$38,000,000 damage to crops.

The year had its quota of juicy scandals. Mrs. Amice Semple MacPherson, the celebrated Evangelist, vanished at Ocean Park, near Los Angeles. Some time later she was discovered at Agua Prieta, Mexico, and was taken across the border to Arizona. She said she was kidnapped, held for ransom, but escaped. There were, however, persistent rumors that she had merely gone on a jaunt with a gentleman friend from her congregation. Joyce Hawley, a seventeen year old show girl, testified that she was abducted and intoxicated and placed in a bathtub on the stage of the Earl Carroll Theatre for one of Carroll's after-theatre parties. Carroll was convicted on the issue of indecency but acquitted of violating the Volstead Act. Edward W. ("Daddy") Browning married Frances ("Peaches") Heenan at Cold Spring, New York. He was 51; she was 15; and the tabloids made a field-day of the event. The Sesqui-centennial Exposition opened at Philadelphia. A superintendent of the New York State Police, Major John A. Warkner, concluded a typical movie romance by marrying the Governor's daughter, Emily Josephine Smith. Rudolph Valentino, the great lover of the screen, was operated on at New York for appendicitis and gastric ulcer. A few days later he died, age 31. One hundred persons were injured in a crowd of thirty thousand that tried to get into the funeral church to view the body. Peggy Scott, actress, killed herself in London because of Valentino's death.

The Hall-Mills murder case was the year's greatest sensation. Mrs. Frances S. Hall and her brothers, Henry and Willie Stevens, were put on trial at Somerville, New Jersey, charged with the murder of Mrs. Eleanor Mills, whose body with that of Mrs. Hall's husband, the Reverend Edward W. Hall, a New Brunswick rector, was found shot to death in a country lane near New Brunswick. The tragedy had occurred in 1922, but no conclusive evidence was produced and the defendants were acquitted.

A highlight in the sports world occurred when an unknown American girl, nineteen years old, swam across the English Channel. She was Gertrude Ederle of New York, and it took her 14

was fought in a rainstorm. Although the fight went the full ten rounds without a knockout, Gene Tunney was declared the world's heavyweight champion. His share of the gate receipts was about \$200,000, but the loser did even better: Dempsey received approximately \$700,000. Bobby Jones of Atlanta, Georgia, won the British open golf championship. Babe Ruth, the "Sultan of Swat," caught a baseball tossed from an airplane at a height of 300 feet at Mitchell Field, Mineola, N. Y. The Cardinals beat the Yankees 4 games to 3 and won the World Series. At Cannes, France, Suzanne Lenglen defeated U. S. tennis champion, Helen Wills.

At Mussolini's suggestion unmarried men between the ages of 25 and 65 in Italy had to pay a special "Bachelor's Tax." This was based on the principle that it was a man's duty to marry and rear children for the state. Lieutenant Commander Richard E. Byrd and his pilot, Floyd Bennett, flew from Spitzbergen to the North Pole, circled it several times, and returned in 15 hours and 51 minutes. In Poland a military revolt was headed by Marshall Pilsudski, who took over control of the government. At Moscow Leon Trotsky and Leon Kamenoff were ousted from the Communist Party.

Dr. Parsons, Secretary of the American Chemical Society, asserted that the whole world knew that Germany, in spite of the ban, was continuing to manufacture and store poison gas, preparing for another war. After bitter wrangling, Fall and Doherty were declared not guilty of a conspiracy to defraud the government. This concluded the end of criminal prosecution of Doherty for dubious oil transactions, although bribery indictments were still pending against him.

The theatre flourished with unusual range. It opened with Eugene O'Neill's *The Great God Brown* staged by Robert Edmond Jones. The melodramatic *Shanghai Gesture*, with Florence Reed as the proprietress of a Chinese brothel, was a sensation which ran for more than 200 performances. *Lulu Belle* was another lurid drama in which Lenore Ulric played a colored harlot of Harlem into a second successful year. The season was sweetened by *The Wisdom Tooth*, an amiable comedy by Marc Connelly, and *The Girl Friend*, with memorable music by Richard Rodgers. Chicago with Francine Larrimore was a burly, bawdy drama which started the town into laughter and applause.

The Pulitzer Prize awards met with critical approval. In the field of fiction the award went to Sinclair Lewis' best-seller, *Arrowsmith*; in drama to George Kelly's *Craig's Wife*; in biography to Harvey Cushing's *The Life of William Osler*; in poetry to Amy Lowell's posthumous *What's O'Clock*.

The song hits of the year included the ever-popular "When Day Is Done," "Charmaine," Gertrude's delightful "Someone To Watch Over Me,"

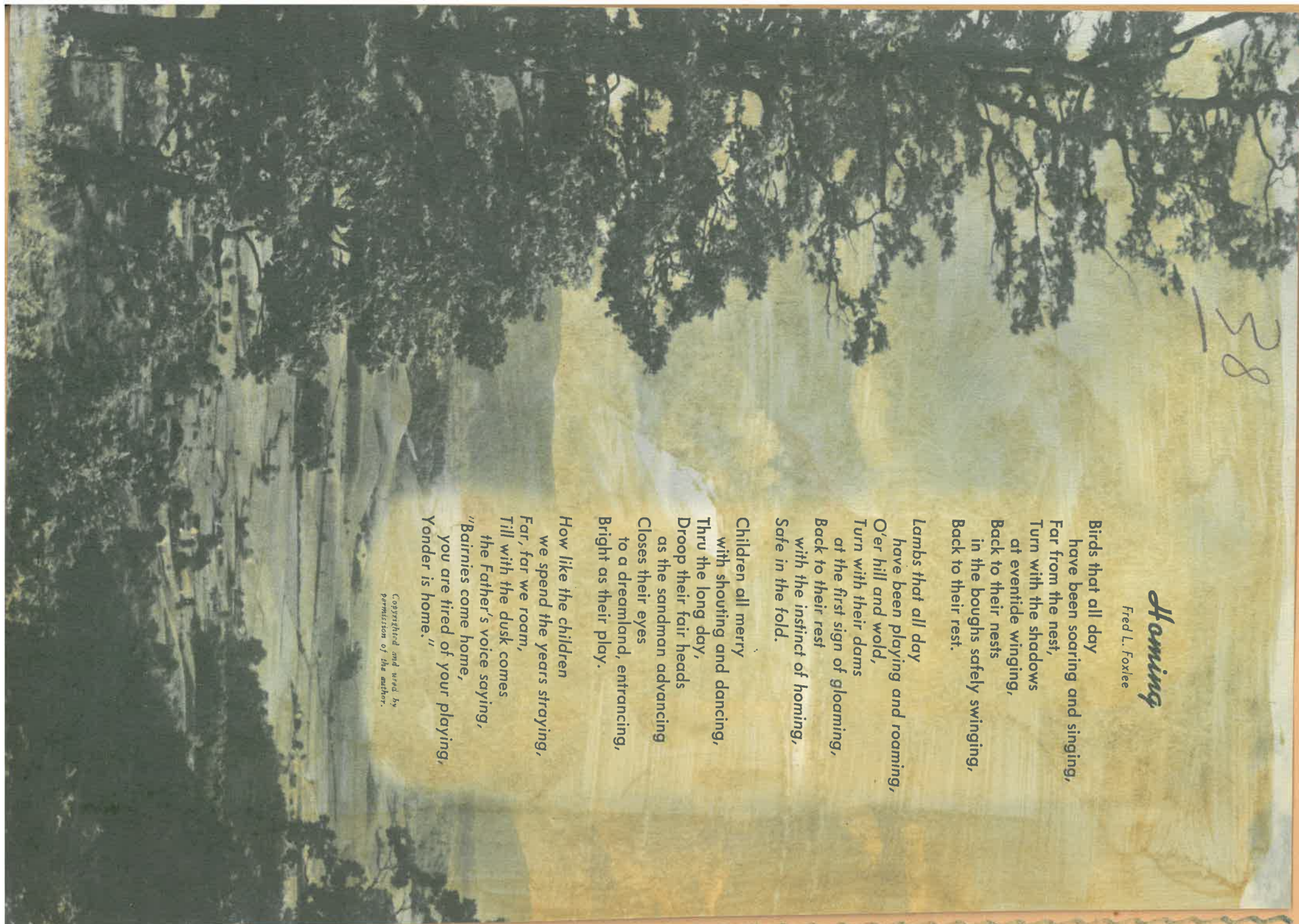

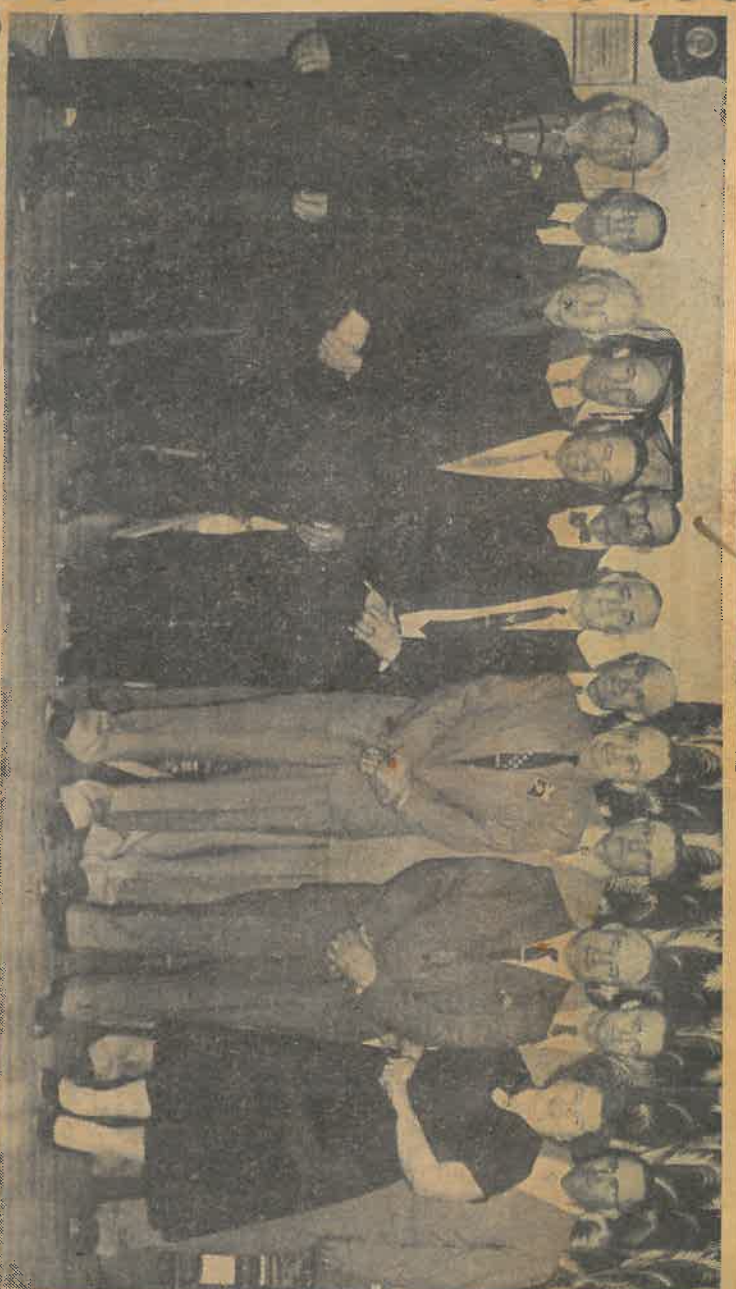

Ralston Grange Burns Hall Mortgage

Members of the Ralston Grange gathered Friday evening for a "Burning of the Mortgage" ceremony to note the final payment on a \$4,000 debt which helped finance their new hall completed in April, 1953.

All of the officers took part in a candlelight ceremony with

state master A. Lars Nelson lighting the mortgage. Celebrating the 30th anniversary this year, the Grangers heard a history of organization read by Ivan Graham. Past masters and 25-year members also were honored.

GRAHAM TOLD members and guests that the first meeting of the Grange was held in

the old Ralston school building May 10, 1930, with Ira Shea, deputy master, presiding. At the first meeting, Rose Weller was elected in a steer. Thirty-eight charter members signed the first roll.

The second meeting was held at the Ralston Community church, Graham said. It was voted to incorporate. In the spring of 1932, the Grange moved its meeting place to the

Ralston Bank.

"These were lean years for agriculture and the Grange, but through hard work and cooperation, the building was purchased for \$400," he explained. "This debt was retired in three years with quilt sales, dances, card parties and donations. This building was the Grange home from 1932 to April 25, 1953, when the present hall was completed."

Graham said that several times committees were appointed and plans made to either remodel the old hall or build a new one. On October 20, 1951, after considerable and careful planning, he noted, the present hall was staked out and started.

THE HALL WAS started with \$3,742.50 available cash at an estimated cost of \$15,000. After several money-making projects and donations, the \$4,000 mortgage financed the completion of the hall.

Graham said 10,734 hours of donated labor and 427 hours of equipment donation were recorded. Over 200 people with 11 Granges represented attended the dedication in 1953.

All past masters except Mrs. Rose Weller and Homer Evans were present at the ceremony Friday evening.

Traffic Mishap Fatal to Emil Hille

A two-car collision north of Ritzville in heavy fog at about 8:20 Tuesday morning claimed the life of Emil (Moose) Hille, 53, well-known farmer on Sage road.

The fatality was the first in Adams county this year. Funeral services will be conducted today (Thursday) at 2 p.m. at Emmanuel Lutheran church, Danekas Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

STATE patrolman Jack Carlson reported that Hille was northbound about 1.7 miles north of Ritzville on Sage road and Ronald R. Danekas, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Danekas, northbound when a head-on collision occurred. Hille died instantly from injuries received. Danekas, a junior at Ritzville high school and forward on the basketball team, suffered a knock, but was not injured.

Both the 1959-model foreign car Hille was driving and the 1953 two-door sedan Danekas was driving were total losses, Carlson said.

Danekas was on his way to school at the time of the accident and Hille was reportedly on his way back to his farm about three miles north of the city after coming into Ritzville to check on a power failure at the farm.

REV. ALBERT Wagner will officiate at the funeral services. Interment will be at the Lutheran cemetery.

Pallbearers will be Herbert Moeller, Ted Wellandt, Calvin Hille, S. E. Edwards, Merle Johnson and Robert Danekas. Emil Otto Hille was born to Mr. and Mrs. Dan R. Hille at Ralston on January 1, 1908. He

attended school in Ritzville and was graduated from Ritzville high school in 1926.

On May 11, 1929, he married Laura Sandbrink in Ritzville. They had farmed at the present location on Sage road for the last 19 years.

He was a member of Emmanuel Lutheran church and Marcellus Grange.

Traffic Mishap Fatal to Emil Hille

A two-car collision north of Ritzville in heavy fog at about 8:20 Tuesday morning claimed the life of Emil (Moose) Hille, 53, well-known farmer on Sage road.

The fatality was the first in Adams county this year. Funeral services will be conducted today (Thursday) at 2 p.m. at Emanuel Lutheran church. Danekas Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

STATE patrolman Jack Carlson reported that Hille was northbound about 1.7 miles north of Ritzville on Sage road and Ronald R. Danekas, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Danekas, was southbound when a head-on collision occurred.

Hille died instantly from injuries received. Danekas, a junior at Ritzville high school and forward on the Bronco basketball team, suffered shock, but was not injured.

Both the 1959-model foreign car Hille was driving and the 1953 two-door sedan Danekas was driving were total losses, Carlson said.

Danekas was on his way to school at the time of the accident and Hille was reportedly on his way back to his farm about three miles north of the city after coming into Ritzville to check on a power failure at the farm.

REV. ALBERT WAGNER will officiate at the funeral services. Interment will be at the Lutheran cemetery.

He was a member of Emanuel Lutheran church and Marcellus Grange.

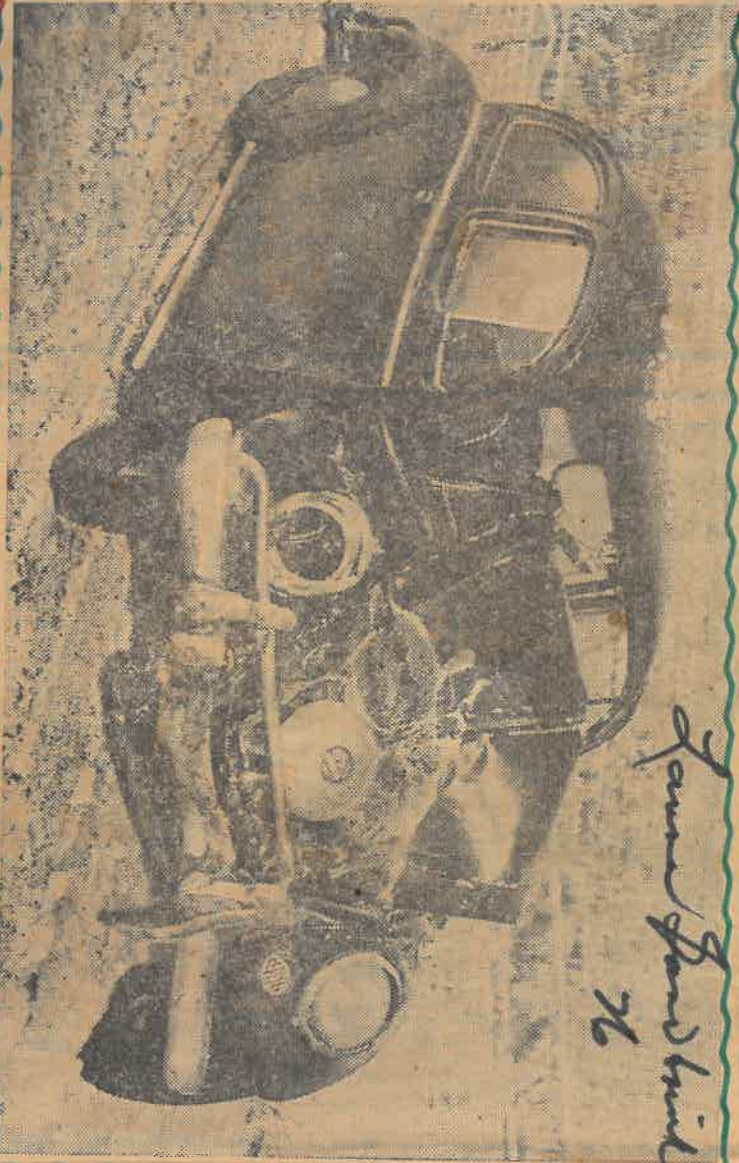
SURVIVING, besides his wife

After the accident, patrolman Carlson urged local motorists to stay on the right side of the road when driving. He pointed

out that driving too near the center of the roadway is a major cause of accidents this time of the year.

"Traveling in the center of the road is especially bad during the winter months," Carlson said. "When ice and snow are on the road, in many places it is almost impossible to turn suddenly from the center of the roadway to your own lane of travel."

The year of prohibitions, portents—and prohibitions was the most hotly combated year in the United States. The Volstead Act, Assistant U. S. Attorney General Clegg's prohibition enforcement, sold the Volstead Act not only in the United States but was being enforced with in-creased vigor in the United States. owned by 135 companies. An inquiry by the New York City Health Department revealed that there had been milk bootlegging, that graft in the last two years had passed the million dollar mark, and that 40% of all loose milk delivered in the city had been skimmed or watered.

A tropical hurricane from the ocean swept the east coast of Florida into Alabama and Mississippi. The casualties were large: 372 killed; 6,281 hurt; 1,881 families temporarily made homeless. In the Bahamas 4,000 were made homeless, and bungalows were blown to pieces all along the Gulf Coast. Storms flooded 36,000 acres in Iowa, doing \$38,000,000 damage to crops.

The year had its quota of juicy scandals. Mrs. Anne Semple McPherson, the celebrated Evangelist, vanished at Ocean Park, near Los Angeles. Some time later she was discovered at Agua Prieta, Mexico, and was taken across the border to Arizona. She said she was kidnaped, held for ransom, but escaped. There were, however, persistent rumors that she had merely gone on a jaunt with a gentleman friend from her congregation. Joyce Hawley, a seventeen year old show girl, testified that she was unclad and intoxicated and placed in a bathtub on the stage of the Earl Carroll Theatre for one of Carroll's after-theatre parties. Carroll was convicted on the issue of indecency but acquitted of violating the Volstead Act. Edward W. ("Paddy") Browning married Frances ("Peaches") Heenan at Cold Spring, New York. He was 51; she was 15; and the tabloids made a field-day of the event. The Sesqui-centennial Exposition opened at Philadelphia. A superintendent of the New York State Police, Major John A. Warner, concluded a typical movie romance by marrying the Governor's daughter, Emily Josephine Smith. Rudolph Valentino, the great lover of the screen, was operated on at New York for appendicitis and gastric ulcer. A few days later he died, age 31. One hundred persons were injured in a crowd of thirty thousand that tried to get into the funeral church to view the body. Peggy Scott, actress, killed herself in London because of Valentino's death.

The Hall-Mills murder case was the year's greatest sensation. Mrs. Frances S. Hall and her brothers, Henry and Willie Stevens, were put on trial at Somerville, New Jersey, charged with the murder of Mrs. Eleanor Mills, whose body with that of Mrs. Hall's husband, the Reverend Edward W. Hall, a New Brunswick rector, was found shot to death in a country lane near New Brunswick. The tragedy had occurred in 1922, but no conclusive evidence was produced and the defendants were acquitted.

A highlight in the sports world occurred when an unknown American girl, nineteen years old, swam across the English Channel. She was Gertrude Ederle of New York, and it took her 14 hours, 31 minutes. At Philadelphia Gene Tunney defeated Jack Dempsey in a ten-round bout which

was fought in a rainstorm. Although the fight went the full ten rounds without a knockdown, Gene Tunney was declared the world's heavyweight champion. His share of the gate receipts was about \$300,000, but the loser did even better; Dempsey received approximately \$700,000. Bobby Jones of Atlanta, Georgia, won the British open golf championship. Babe Ruth, the "Sultan of Swat" caused a baseball tossed from an airplane at a height of 300 feet at Mitchell Field, Mineola, N. Y. The Cardinals beat the Yankees 4 games to 3 and won the World Series. At Cannes, France, Suzanne Lenglen defeated U. S. tennis champion, Helen Wills.

At Mussolini's suggestion unmarried men between the ages of 25 and 65 in Italy had to pay a special "Bachelor's Tax." This was based on the principle that it was a man's duty to marry and rear children for the state. Lieutenant Commander Richard E. Byrd and his pilot, Floyd Bennett, flew from Spitzbergen to the North Pole, circled it several times, and returned in 15 hours and 51 minutes. In Poland a military revolt was headed by Marshall Pilsudski, who took over control of the government. At Moscow Leon Trotsky and Leon Kamenoff were ousted from the Communist Party.

Dr. Parsons, Secretary of the American Chemical Society, asserted that the whole world knew that Germany, in spite of the ban, was continuing to manufacture and store poison gas, preparing for another war. After bitter wrangling, Fall and Doheny were declared not guilty of a conspiracy to defraud the government. This concluded the end of criminal prosecution of Doheny for dubious oil transactions, although bribery indictments were still pending against him.

The theatre flourished with unusual range. It opened with Eugene O'Neill's *The Great God Brown* staged by Robert Edmund Jones. The melodramatic *Shanghai Gesture*, with Florence Reed as the proprietress of a Chinese brothel, was a sensation which ran for more than 200 performances. *Lulu Belle* was another lurid drama in which Lenore Ulric played a colored harlot of Harlem into a second successful year. The season was sweetened by *The Wisdom Tooth*, an amiable comedy by Marc Connelly, and *The Girl Friend*, with memorable music by Richard Rodgers. Chicago with Franneine Larrimore was a burly, bawdy drama which startled the town into laughter and applause.

The Pulitzer Prize awards met with critical approval. In the field of fiction the award went to Sinclair Lewis' best-seller, *Arrowsmith*; in drama to George Kelly's *Crags Wife*; in biography to Harvey Cushing's *The Life of William O'Ster*; in poetry to Amy Lowell's posthumous *What's O'Clock*. The song hits of the year included the ever-popular "When Day Is Done," "Charmin'," Gertrude Swin's delightful "Someone To Watch Over Me," Romberg's never-failing "Desert Song" and others included in this record.

In 1956 the school celebrated it's 50th ANNIVERSARY with a banquet at the Marcelus Grange Hall with over 500 in attendance. Our DIAMOND Jubilee will be in May of 1980 when we will celebrate our 75th year. I have no intention of carrying this history beyond that date.

Each book is 12" x 14" in size and the sheets are reinforced with scotch tape. Each SHEET contains the following information: NAME of each GRADUATE, (full name if possible), address, signature, birthday, names of husband or wife and children, their parents and dates, relatives who graduated or attended RHS, school and college records, marriage, family activities, death data, trade or profession and where live and work, and any other data or information which can be gathered from newspapers, magazines, letters, interviews or from any other source possible.

I have endeavored to arrange the material in a neat and orderly fashion and the names alphabetically and chronologically when possible. I realize many mistakes have been made in placing correct data in the proper place but so many of the names are duplicated, Mr. Vic Rogel helped me immensely in the identification of families also Mrs. Mabel Burrill and Mrs. Robert Clark. (Miller) and many others too too numerous to mention. Of the faculty Mr. Lloyd was wonderful in his assistance.
