The Sophomores entered Senior High in 1940 with flying colors.

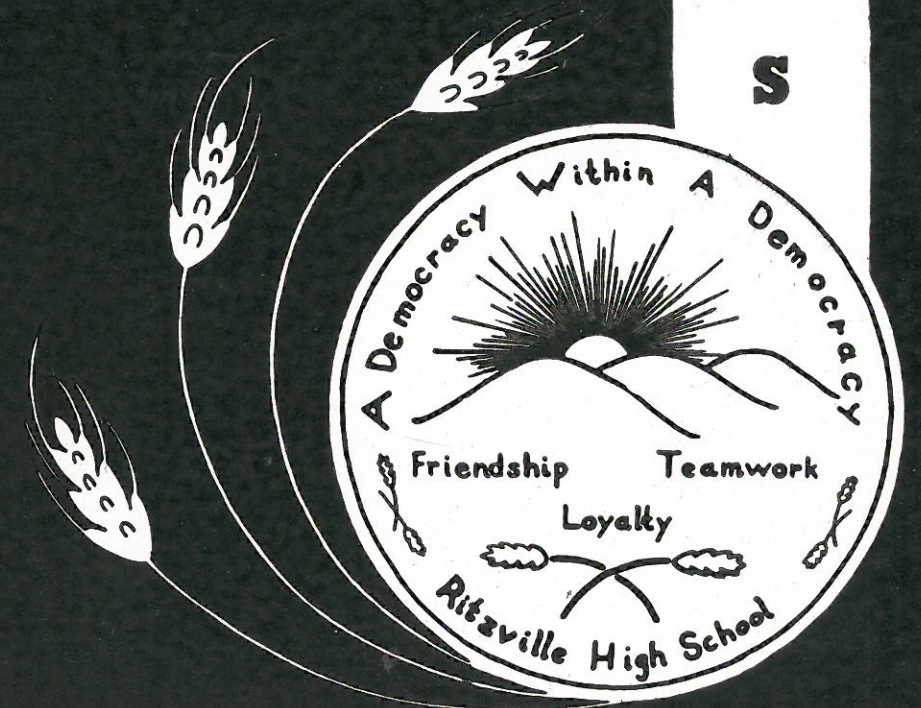
Our first step was to elect our class adviser—Coach Jones, which was followed by the election of our class officers.

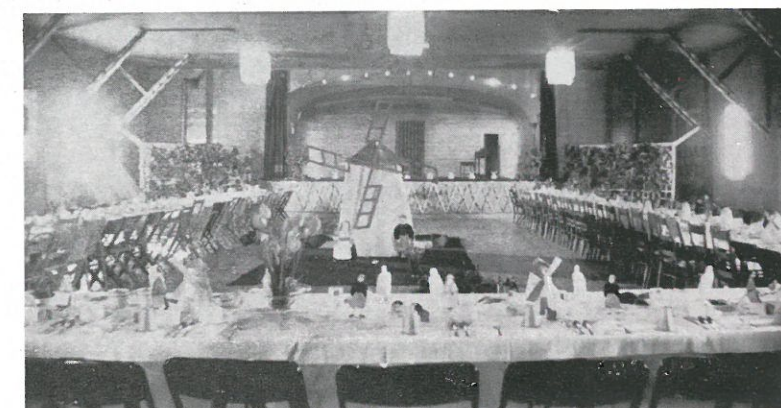

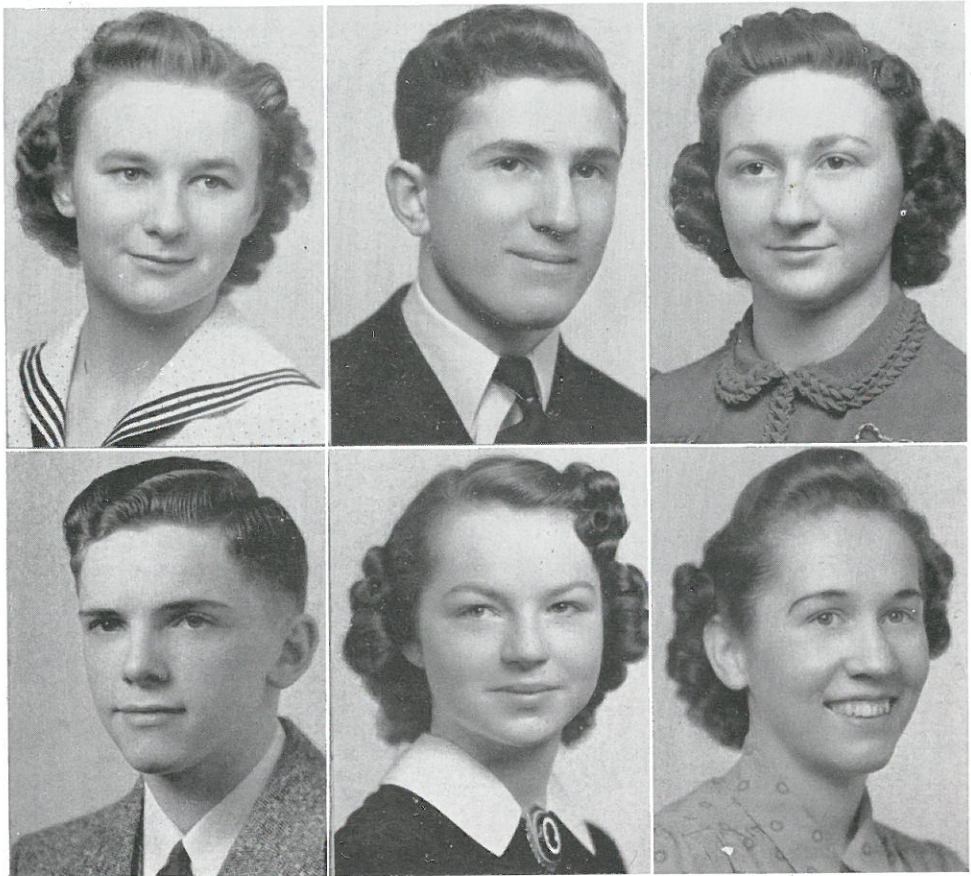
The student council is the executive-legislative body of the Associated Students of Ritzville high school. It is made up of five student body officers, the president and secretary of each class, the four homeroom presidents, and the duly elected representatives or presidents of the Boys' Federation and the Girls' Federation.

Their duties consist largely of the making of the necessary by-laws to regulate the government of the Associated Students, the settling of such difficulties as may arise between classes or other organizations within the school, the authorization of the expenditure of the funds of the student body, and aiding in the promotion and development of the student activities having the approval of the council.

(They meet regularly once every two weeks or as often as the business before the council demands.)

The philosophy of the administration and faculty of Ritzville high school calls for making the student democracy a reality, giving the students through their duly elected officers as much of a voice in the running of their school as their experience and the practical limitations of time will permit. This makes the student council the heart of the student government program.

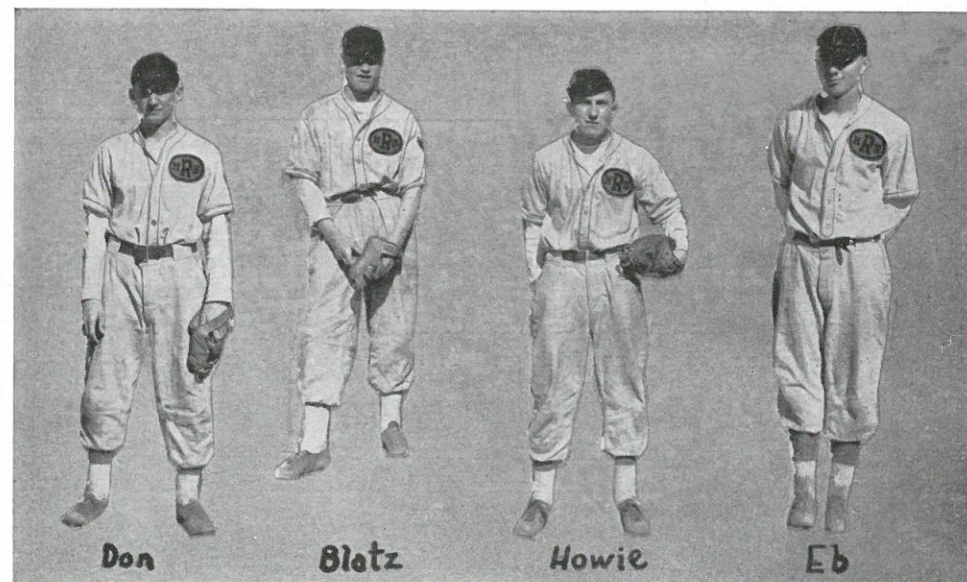

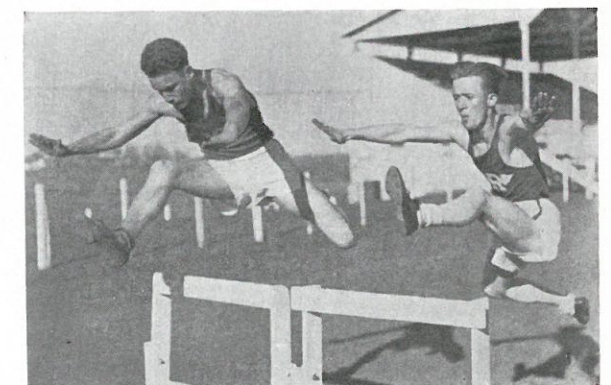

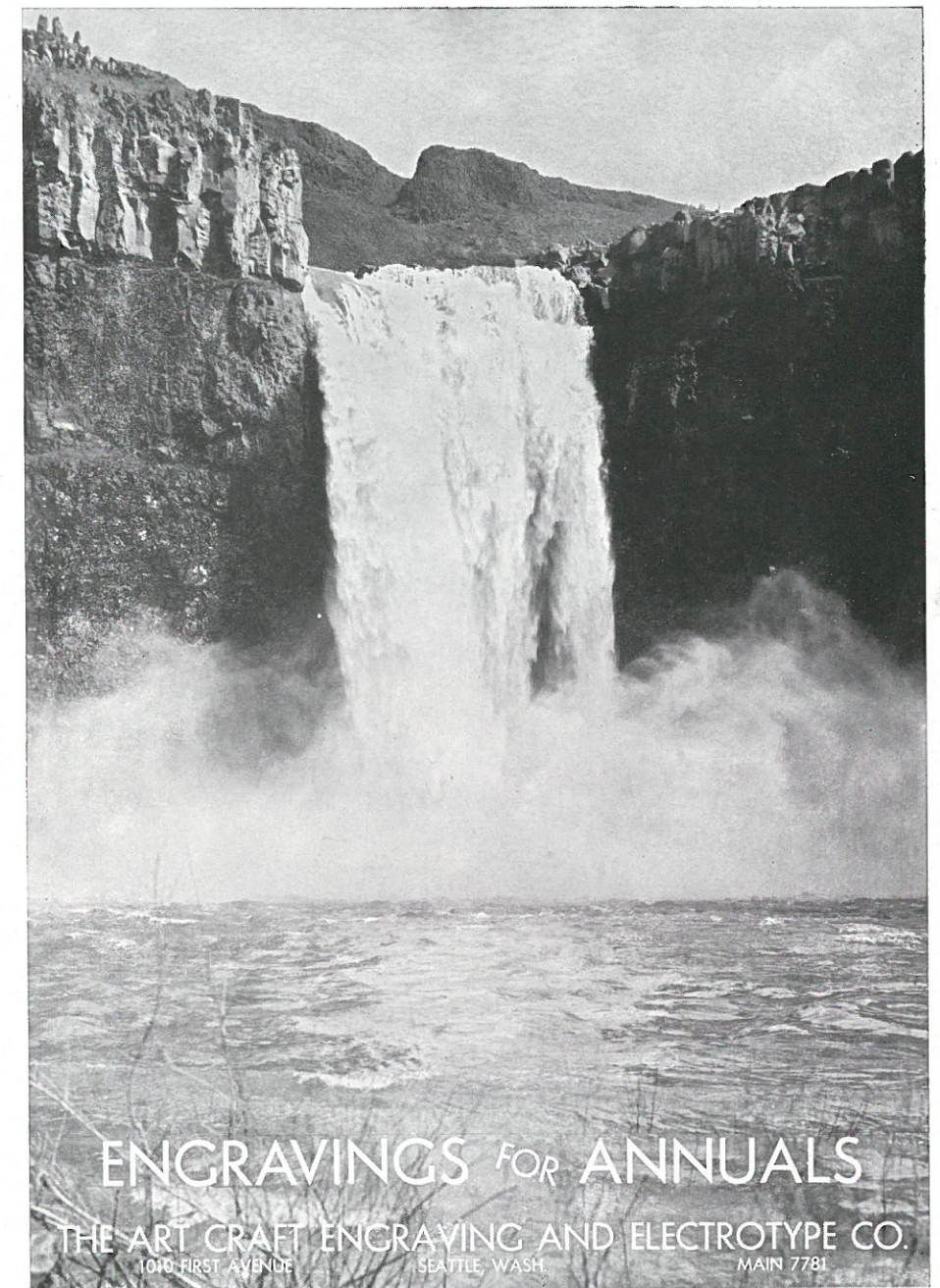
