




### SCHOOL TRADITIONS . . .

Ritzville Senior High School has acquired many traditions in its time, adopting new ones and discarding some of the older ones. In referring to a tradition, we mean a practice that has been handed down from the past. This is not to be confused with a custom, which is the habitual practice of doing the same thing, in the same way over and over again.

The senior class day, one of the best-known traditions in Ritzville High School, is held during the last month of school. The day dawns bright with the seniors appearing in outlandish costumes. A program following some selected theme is presented to the rest of the students in the afternoon. Much interest is shown in the laughter-provoking class will and prophecy.

Years ago it was customary to hold the class day exercises in the morning, but it was changed to an evening performance by the class of 1930. As time wore on it was brought back to an afternoon program, which is the tradition as it now stands.

The annual Mother's Day tea and program is sponsored by the Girls' League. Written invitations are extended to all high school students' mothers. The mothers look forward from year to year to the one tradition that is held in their honor.

The R. H. S. Alumni Association, one of the most active high school alumni groups in the state, makes its one annual meeting a special occasion by welcoming the seniors into the ranks of the alumni. It also brings together many of the old graduates of Ritzville High School. This banquet marks the end of the seniors' high school career and extends special honors to the class of twenty-five years ago.

Is everybody ready? Have we got all the food? Well then, let's go! We're off on a class day picnic. In previous years the three classes have celebrated together, but now only the senior class is allowed school time for a picnic. Due to gas rationing during war time the picnics of the last few years have been held close to home.

Each year is "topped off" by one formal affair, the Junior-Senior Banquet, which is the social event of the year. It is a gala event given by the juniors to honor the seniors. The theme of the banquet is secret to the guests until the final evening. A speech of welcome is given by the junior class president, and a response is then heard from the president of the senior class. Various other speeches and musical numbers complete the evening. Much hard work and planning is put into these banquets and it is with a sense of pride that the juniors honor the seniors.

Traditions such as those mentioned have been set up over a period of years. Each year the personnel of the various classes is different, as is the interpretation of the many school events, but over a period of time the most memorable events seem to take on greater significance, because they are an essential part of our school's social and cultural life.

We also like to think that Ritzville High School has some more or less intangible traditions. Pride in the appearance of our school grounds and buildings, respect for our faculty, a vigorous school spirit, and a feeling of cooperation, are in a sense our basic school traditions, which in later years assume their just importance in the minds and hearts of the alumni of R. H. S.



# ... SCHOOL MUSIC

The band has had a very active year and has furnished an opportunity for many students to participate in music activities. Throughout the year the band helped to lend color and interest to pep rallies and games as well as assisting downtown on special occasions.

Two special features of the year for the band were the annual fall and spring concerts. A trumpet trio, sousaphone solo, clarinet octette and trombone trio appeared as part of the fall concert. The combined junior and senior high school band composed of 104 pieces was featured at the spring concert on April 28. Several popular pieces were included in the spring concert program along with a United Nations flag display and march. Under the excellent direction of Mr. Hunt the band closed a successful year in its last performance at the Commencement program.

Eugene Ahrendt, violinist, has appeared on several school programs and received the highest rating of "A" at a music audition in Spokane sponsored by the Cheney Kiwanis Club which entitled him to compete in the final auditions at Cheney in May.

June Heinemann, pianist, accompanied at concerts and programs. In March she received the rating of "excellent" in a music meet sponsored by the Washington State Fedration of Music.

The senior high girls' sextette was one of the most outstanding vocal groups our school has had for a number of years. Under the competent direction of Miss Lenora Martin the sextette has earned a fine reputation for its many excellent performances. Major school events which featured the sextette included the spring and fall concerts, school plays, and various appearances before local clubs and civic groups. School programs in which they participated were further enhanced by an added interest in setting. During April the sextette presented a program at Baxter Hospital in Spokane; in May they were scheduled for radio programs at K. W. S. C., Pullman, and K. H. Q., Spokane. 
