In the year 1936, 41 members assembled at Central School for the first time as a class. (My what a difference from the first day.) The outstanding achievements were as follows: there were a few of the boys and girls in a play called "The Land of Dreams Came True". Some other things were a playhouse. We girls had, and made curtains and furnishings for it. Then we made animals out of carboard for a circus. We had a contest to see who could do the best.

The next year five members were added to our group making a total of forty-six. A few also left us. This year we were still small but a little more sure of ourselves. Achievements were the Dutch Dance Song put on by our class and we had a small post office where we bought and sold stamps.

In the fourth grade we were larger and a bit more confident. We began to do our division problems and had a beginning in history and geography.

This was our first year in Junior High. We all had headaches the first few days trying to find our way around the building. We were again the small insignificant group. This year there were a few of us in the Junior High play "All American Family", under the direction of Miss McLeod.

We again began to feel at home, we were the middle-aged and sized group of the Junior High. We could help the new sevens. We again felt more important. This year there were some in the Junior High play "Huckleberry Finn" under the direction of Miss Wirth. We also played in the spring concert.

In the school year 1944-45 we again for the second time became the leaders of our school. We could not have done very well without the cooperation of the 7th and 8th graders. This year there was quite a few of us in the Junior High play "Raggedy Nan" under the direction of Miss Wirth. There were also a lot of us that played for the spring concert and fall concert. One of the things we are proud of and we helped with was the honor roll.

In the tenth grade we are again at the bottom working up and really taking an interest in the things that the upper class men are doing. But we are going at it with more confidence than we had when we were in the seventh grade.

We are now Juniors and getting quite a kick out of doing almost the same things as the Seniors. We gave the Junior Class play, "Reserve Two for Murder" under the direction of Mr. Rowe.

Our last year in school, the time sure passes quickly when ther is so much to do. This year the Seniors put on a play called the "Divine Flora" under the direction of Ruth Pearson Alcorn, our adviser. Our progressive class had 44 members.

Our school years have been happy ones and we hope that the incoming Seniors will have as much fun as we have had. We wish to thank all the people who have helped us to have a very successful year.


THE DIVINE FLORA














Davenport won the conference championship.


EPHRATA

The team enjoyed a long trip up in the north country but found those big loggers tough and took a 33-0 setback.


A steady rain and Odessa's 19-7 victory over the Broncos dampened the R. H. S. homecoming.

BASKETBALL RESUME 1947-1948

Ritzville's fast-breaking Broncos enjoyed another winning season in basketball. At the end of the season schedule the Broncos had won 16 and lost 4. Among the wins was a thrilling 42-21 victory over Harrington, the N. E. District Champions The Broncos twice defeated Moses Lake, Grant County Champions and broke even with Ephrata, winners of the Grant County district tournament. The powerful Endicott team defeated the Broncos twice during the season and were the only team able to do that. Harrington snapped the Broncos long conference game winning streak at 23. By virtue of their win, Harrington was able to tie Ritzville for the conference leadership and defeated the Broncos at Cheney in a play-off by 39-33. The Broncos defeated Davenport for the third time in the play-off for third place in the Bi-county. The boys aided by Schoesler's accurate shooting won by 38-25.


The Broncos were now qualified to meet the third place teams in Stevens, Spokane and Pend Orielle counties. The strength of the Bi-county league was quite evident as Ritzville trounced Ione 51-28 and Cheney 42-22 for a place in the District Tournament.

By virtue of their victories in the play-off the Broncos had qualified for a berth in the N. E. District for the seventh straight year. Ritzville drew the big Chewelah team and with Merrill Schutz scoring 13 points they upset the Stevens county champions by 38-31.

The Broncos then faced Reardan, the Bi-county champions and lost a heartbreaker by 37-36. A free throw in the final seconds spelled defeat and second place in the district was lost.

Ritzville met Colville and played one of their finest games of the season and won 45-41. Schutz again paced the Broncos with 15 points.

It was a tired Ritzville team that met Fairfield in the game to decide third place; their ninth game in sixteen days. Fairfield outraced the Broncos and won by 55-35 and our hopes to play in the State B were gone.


