
Besides working in the gym, Martha has been driving a bus 17 years and working on the ground crew for 5

















ever devoted teachers are hard at work. They review lesson plans, correct last minute papers, or attend






"The main goal I had for the year was for the students to develop lead-
















Throughout the year, the girls always kept in mind what they were reaching for. Many hours of hard work and dedication were involved, and all eleven girls put forth an immense amount of effort.

The Bronco team finished with a record of 21-26 overall, 7-9 league, third place at the Bi-County tournament, and fourth place in District play. All in all it was a successful season.







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Conservative leads Brazil election

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil — Early unofficial returns Wednesday night showed conservative Fernando Collor de Mello leading Brazil's first free and direct presidential election since 1960.

With about 8 percent of the votes counted, Collor de Mello, who led most exit polls with 30 percent, had 2,225,909 votes, followed by left-wing populist Leonel Brizola with 1,628,735 votes, said Globo TV, the nation's largest network.

Late Wednesday the government announced a 12-hour delay in the official count, reportedly because of computer problems.

In third place was Luis Inacio Lula da Silva of the Marxist-orient-

23-month-old Palestinian uprising had ordered increased use of firearms to attack soldiers.

Palestinians shot a soldier to death Monday in Gaza, but the PLO has directed that firearms not be used. The most common weapons are stones and firebombs.

Forty-one Israelis have been killed since the uprising began Dec. 8, 1987, including eight soldiers. Israeli soldiers or civilians have killed at least 615 Palestinians.
