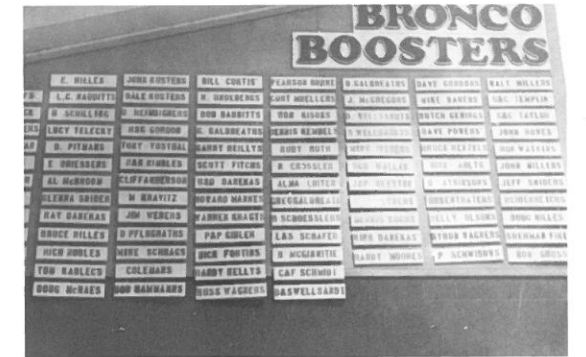

Projects of past years have included purchasing new

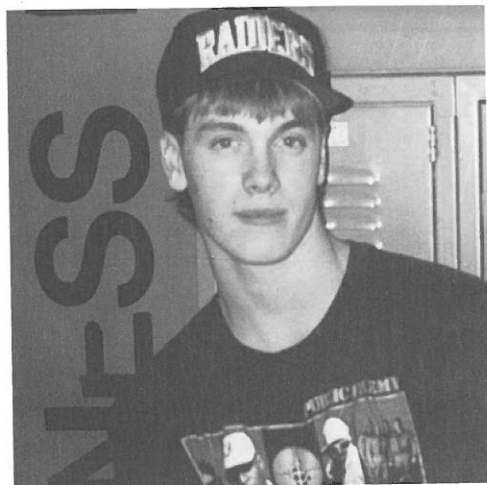
band uniforms, basketball hoops, new goal posts for the football field, FFA judging trips, and the Bronco mascot in front of the school.

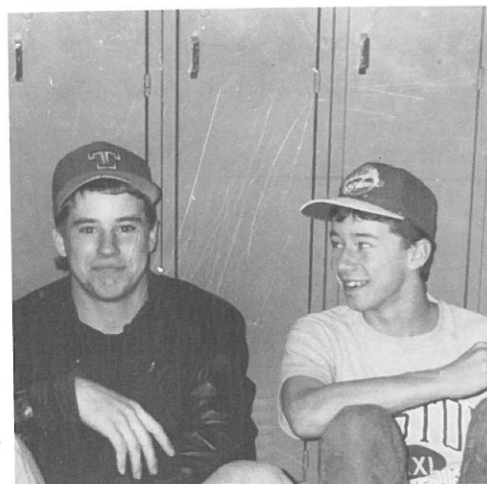

The RHS student body and faculty are grateful for the support of the Bronc Booster Club. We once again would like to thank them for contributing to Ritzville High School youth activities.

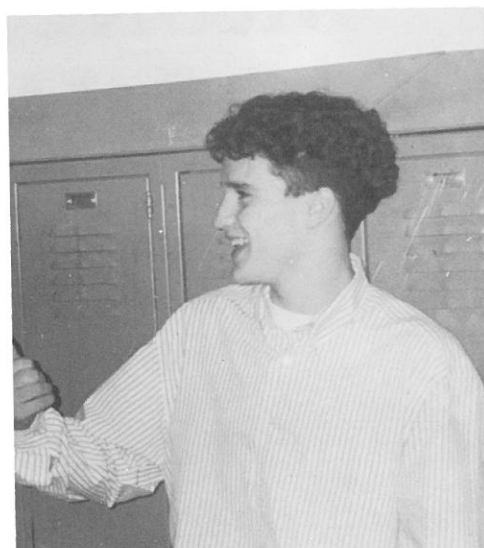

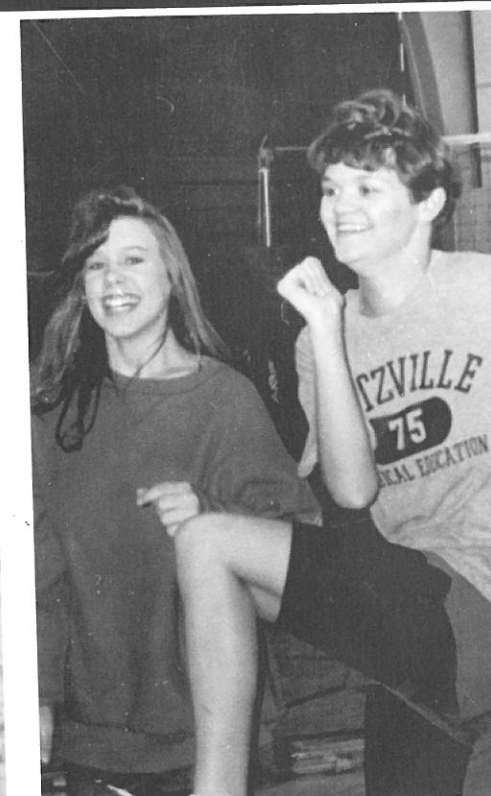

## Great in a Lot of "Wittle" Ways!

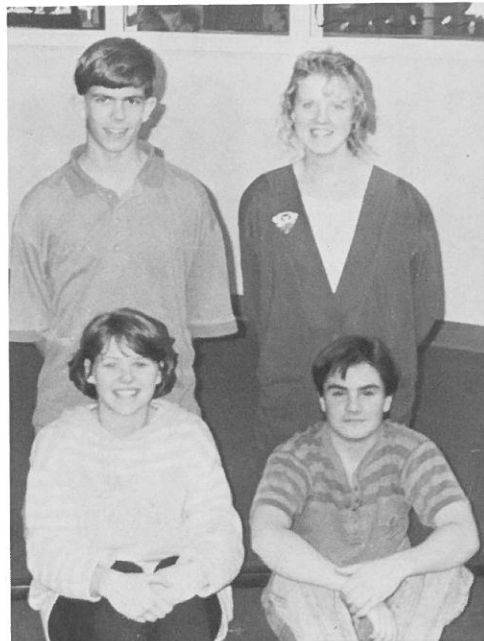
The freshman class of 1995 is a very large group of well-rounded students. There are 47 students in this class, 23 girls and 23 boys, and they are all active in sports and school.

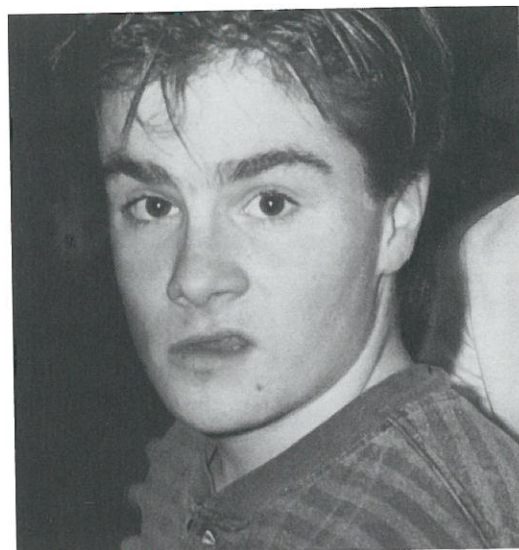

The sophomores represent our school with pride. Much of the class has become involved in a wide variety of clubs such as Pep Club, FFA, FBLA,

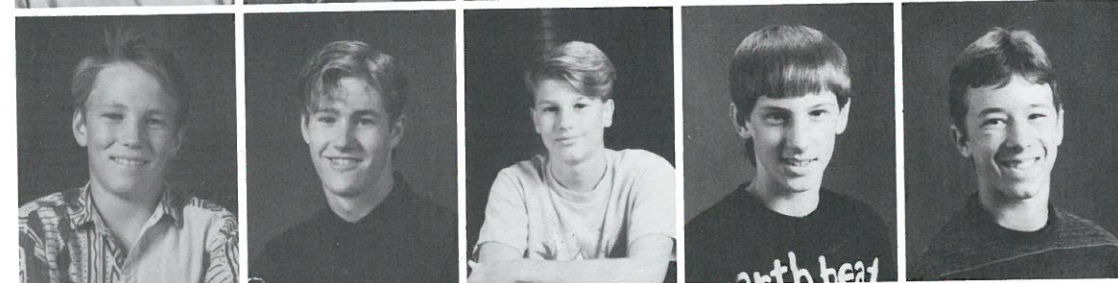

As a second term president, Eric Rosentrater has shown strong leadership that has helped the classwork together. When asked, Eric and Da-

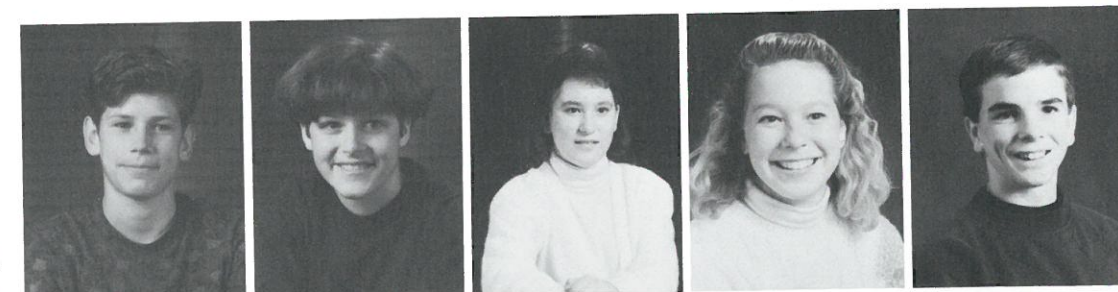

This year's Homecoming was a big step for the Juniors in that they came in second over all. Their

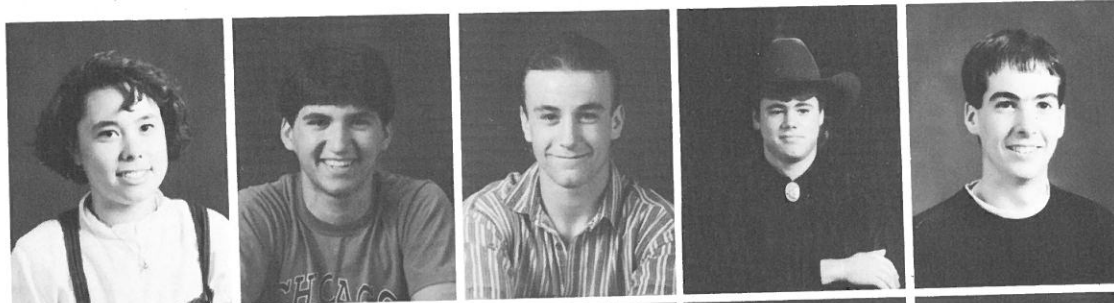
skit on Garth Brook's song "I got friends in low places" was a smashing hit. In the competition they finished very well, defeating all of the previous year's track records.

"This year the Junior class has grown up a lot more than the years before," stated Tana Kimble.

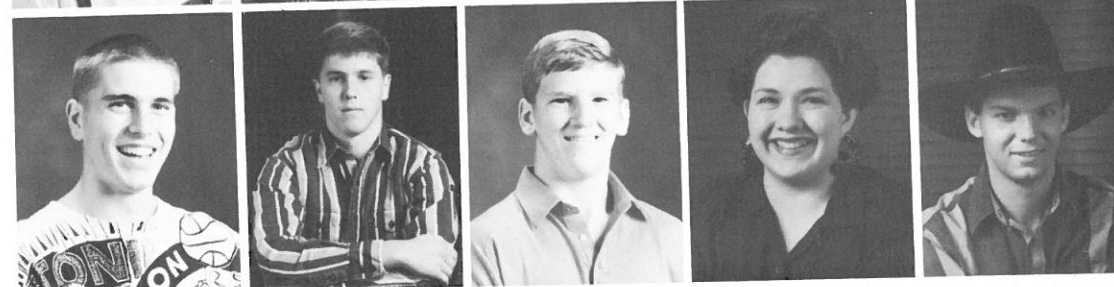

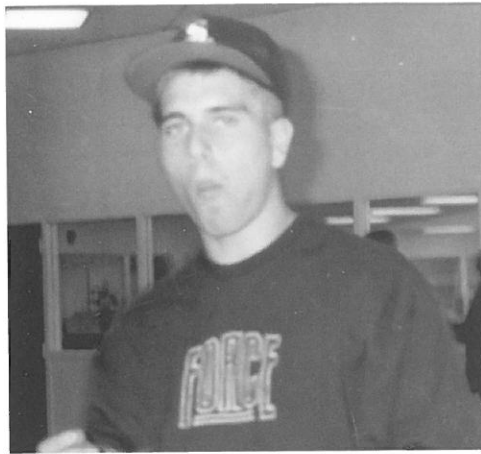


"Our class has matured a lot and in that process grown apart a little, but they are a lot more willing to help."

This year Ritzville High School Honor Society has added 20 new members, 4 seniors and 16 sophomores. The Honor Society now consists of 34 well-rounded students.

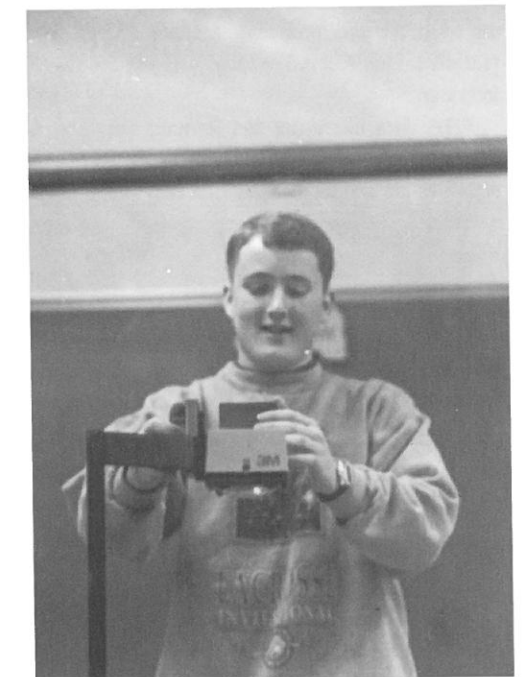

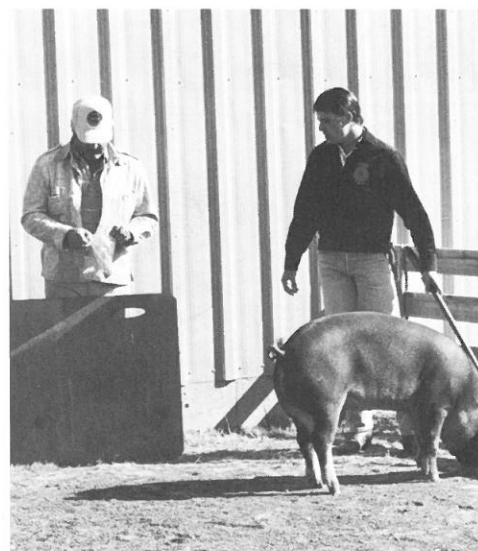

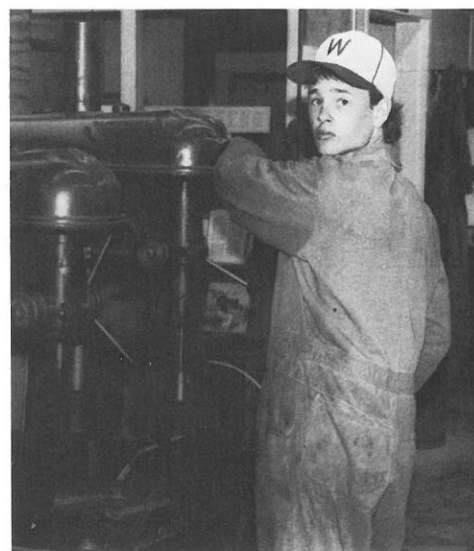

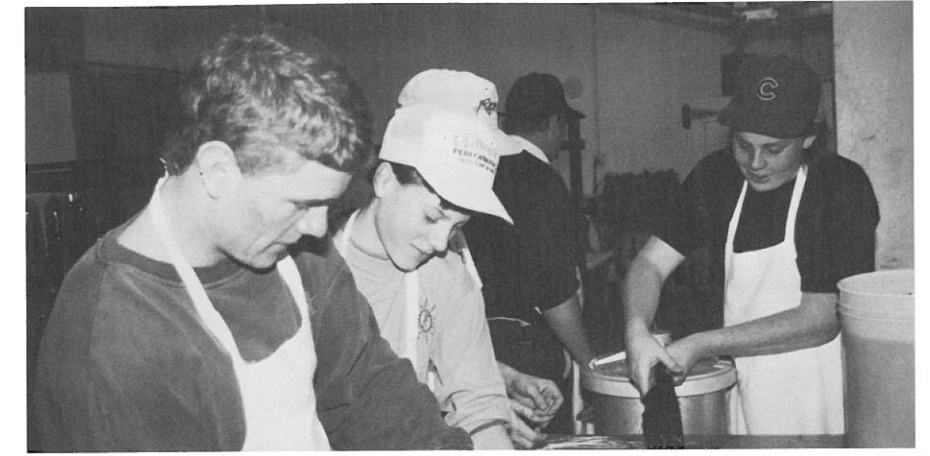

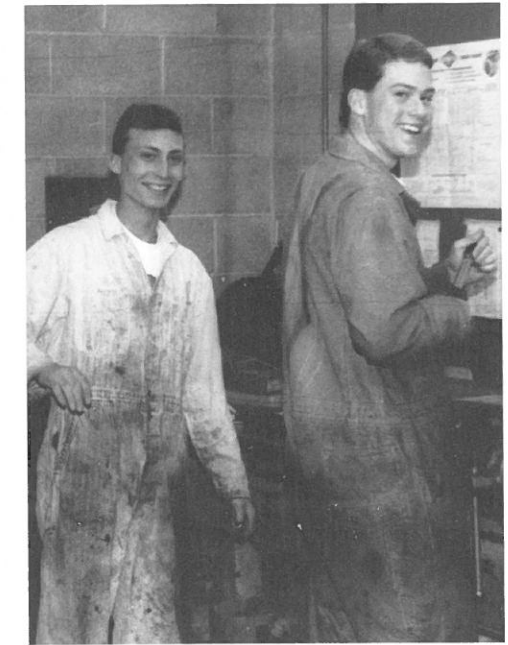

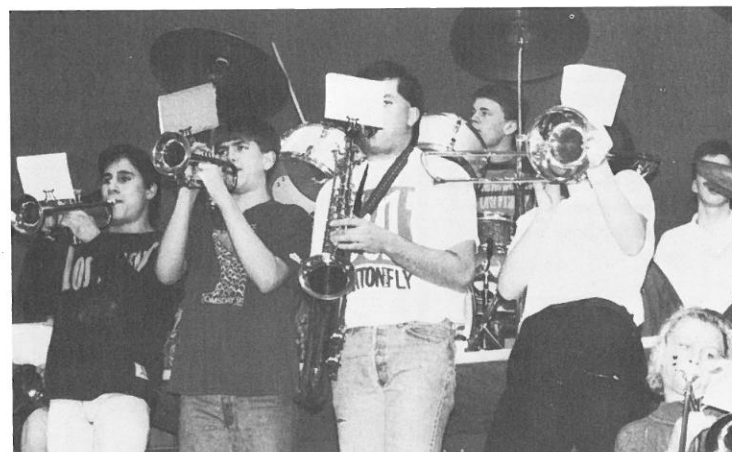

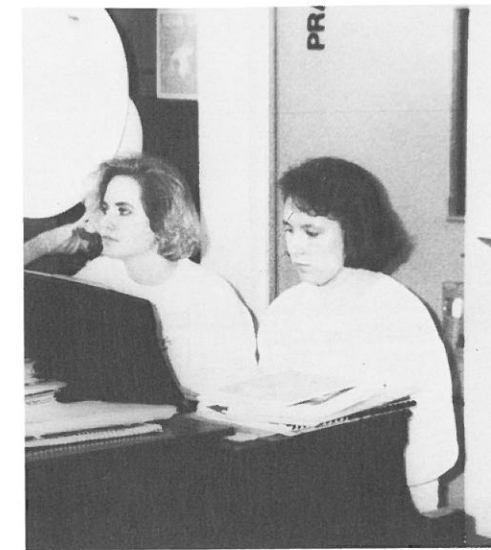

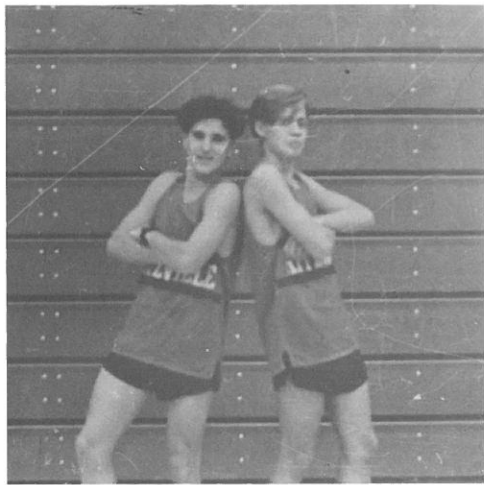
There are 50 students in choir, making it the biggest choir in ten years. The choir is split into

There are approximately 75 Red R members this year. "The only significant factor this year in Red R is that we have many new members," said Keith Collins.

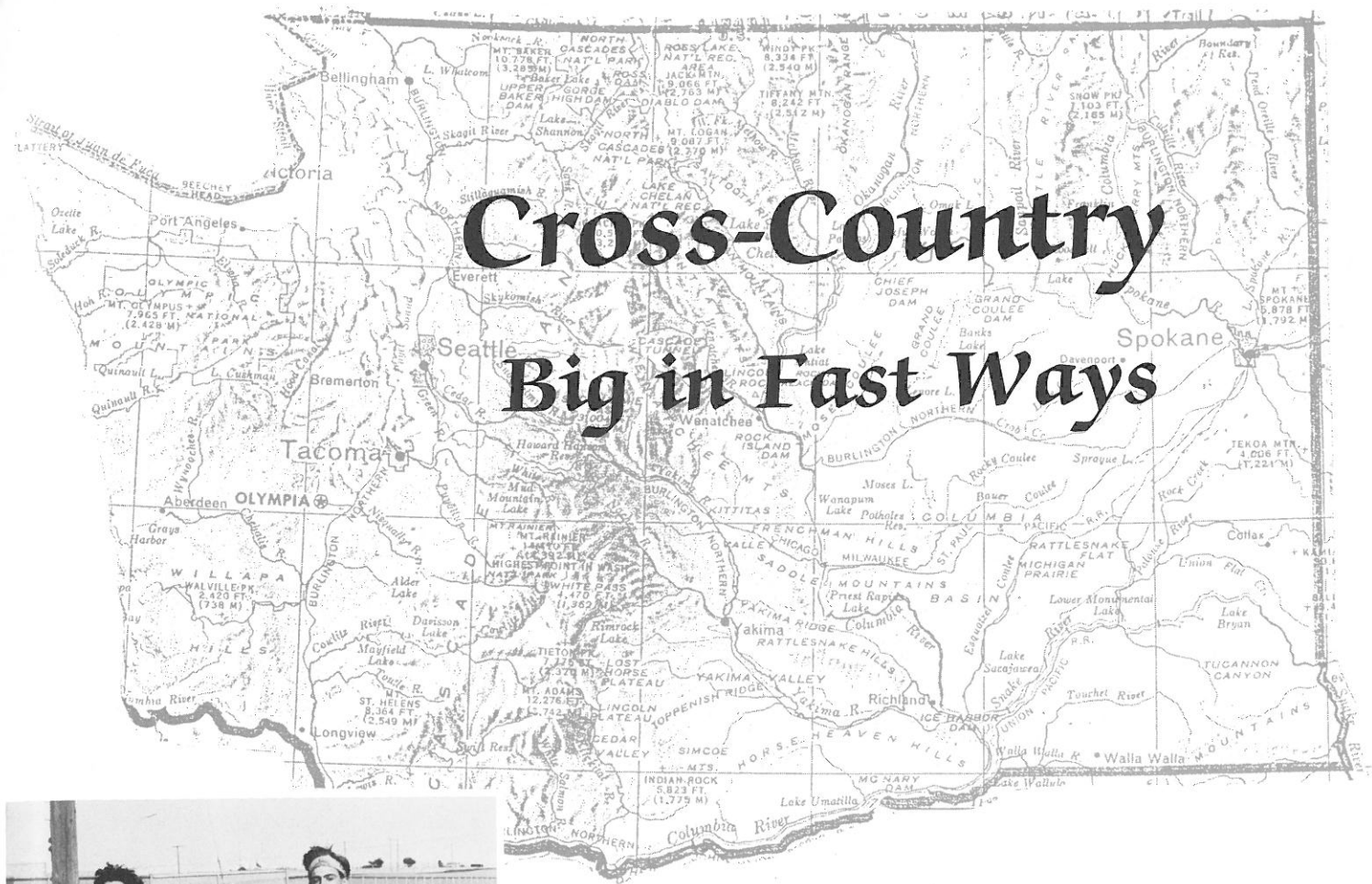

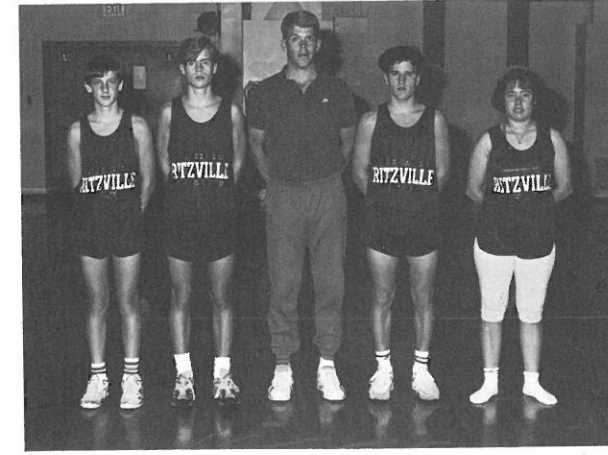

Paul Staley said, "I wish I could have gone farther but because of illness I couldn't."

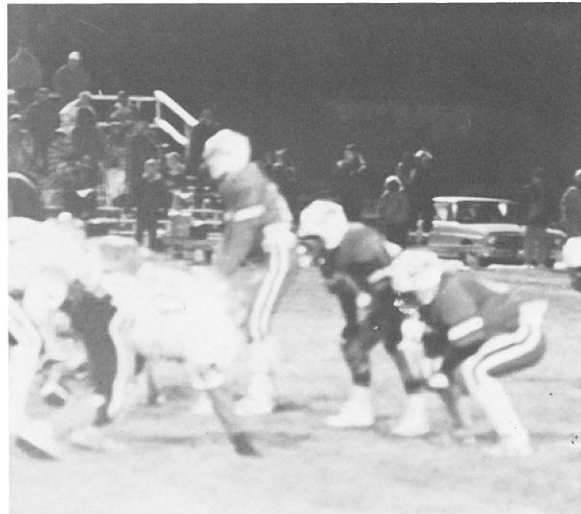

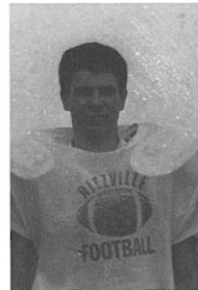

A few of the players quote, "This football season was a fun experience, one that will be well remembered, and we hope to improve in the years to come."

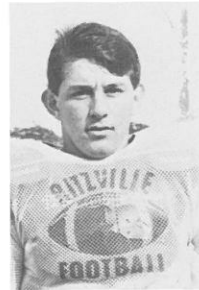

"I also enjoyed each and every one of them. I especially enjoyed beating Freeman one game of the match," Coach Sackmann added.

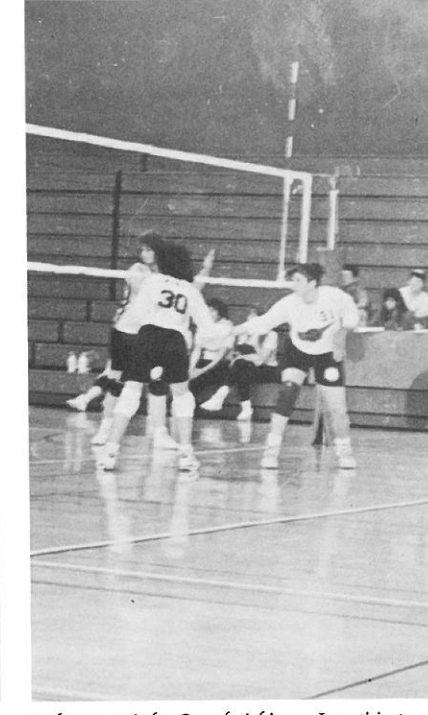

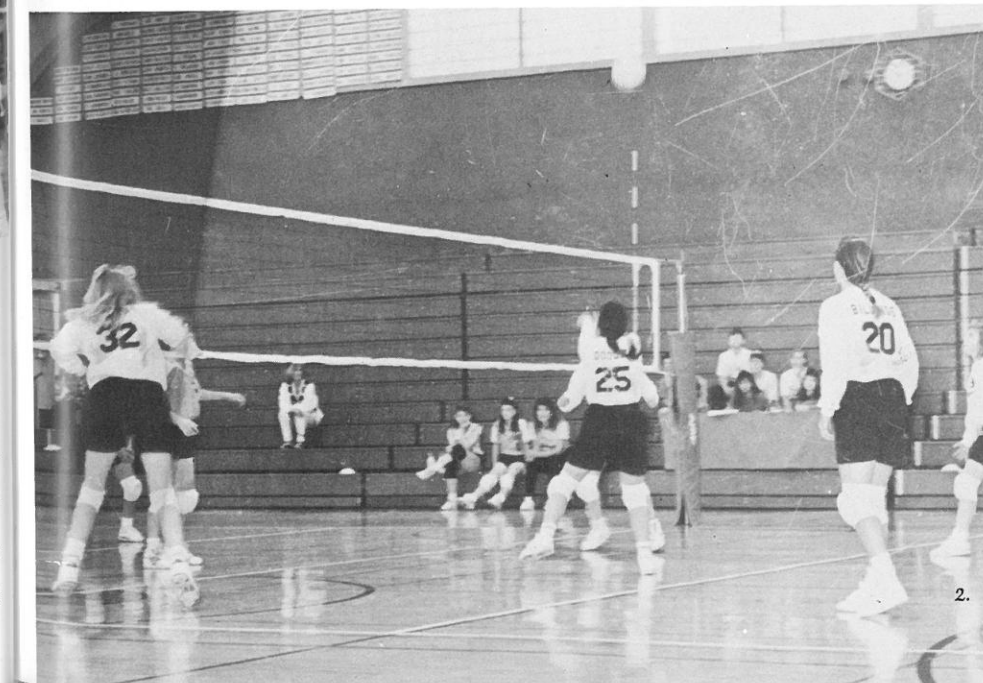

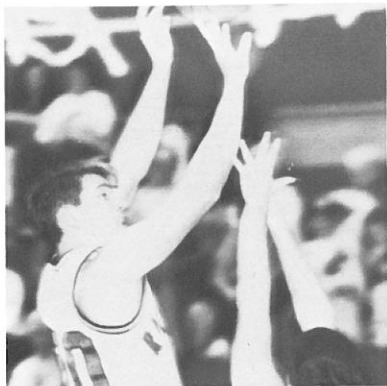
# Boys' JV Basketball

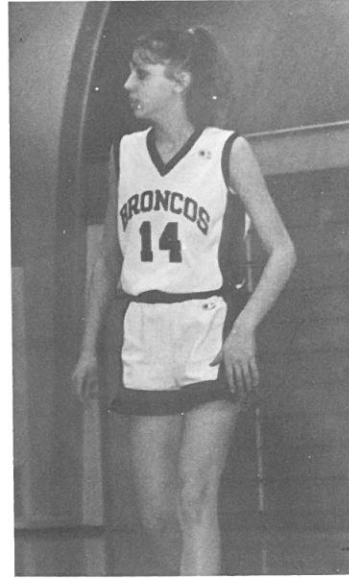

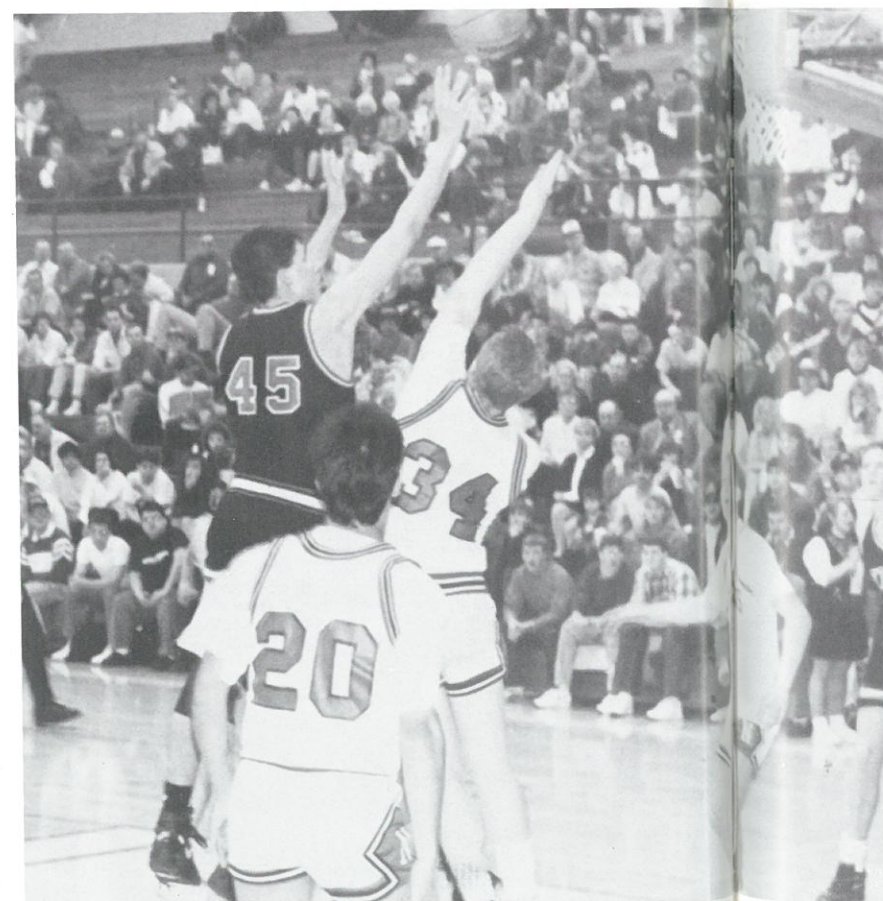

The leading shooter for the boys was Jeff Snider with 330 pts in this year's

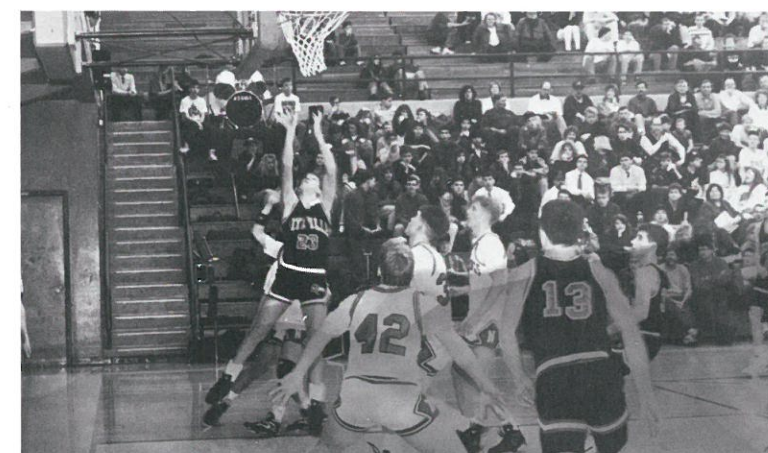

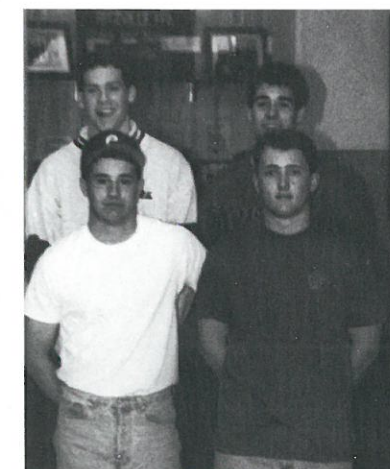

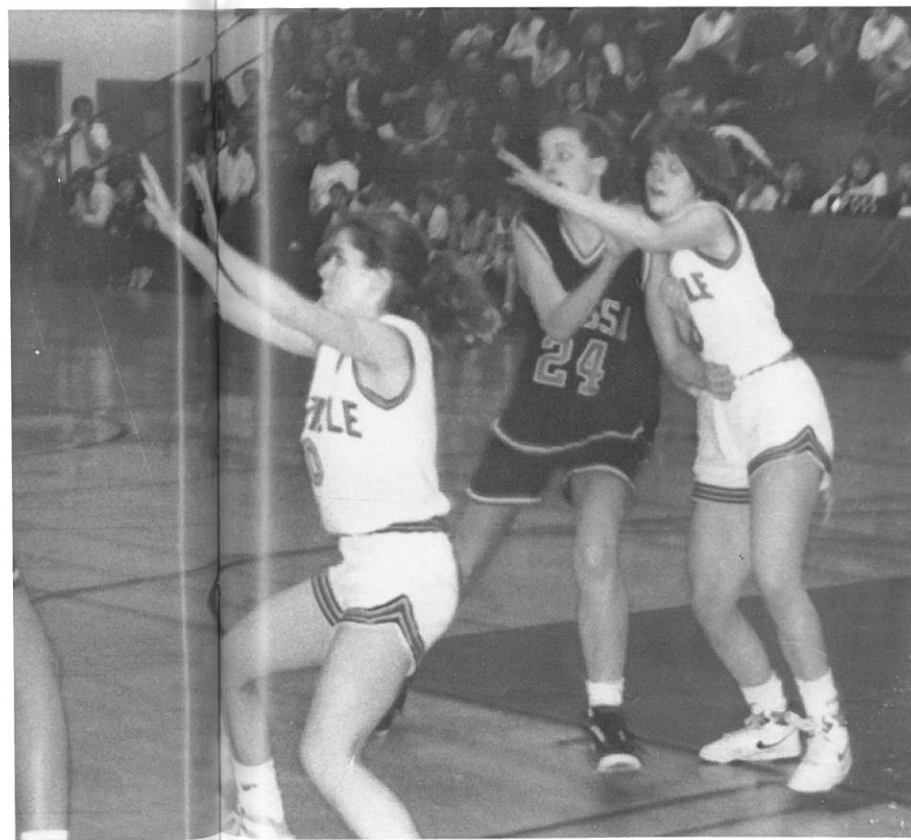

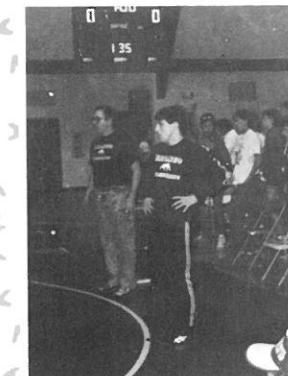

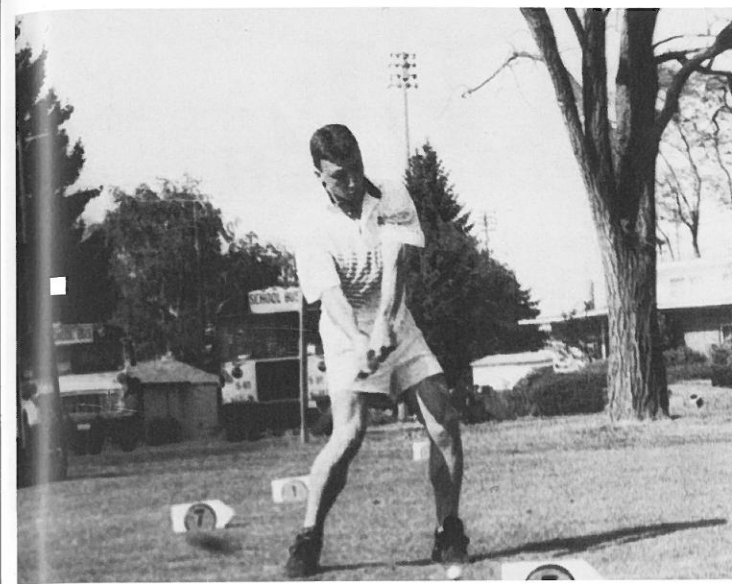

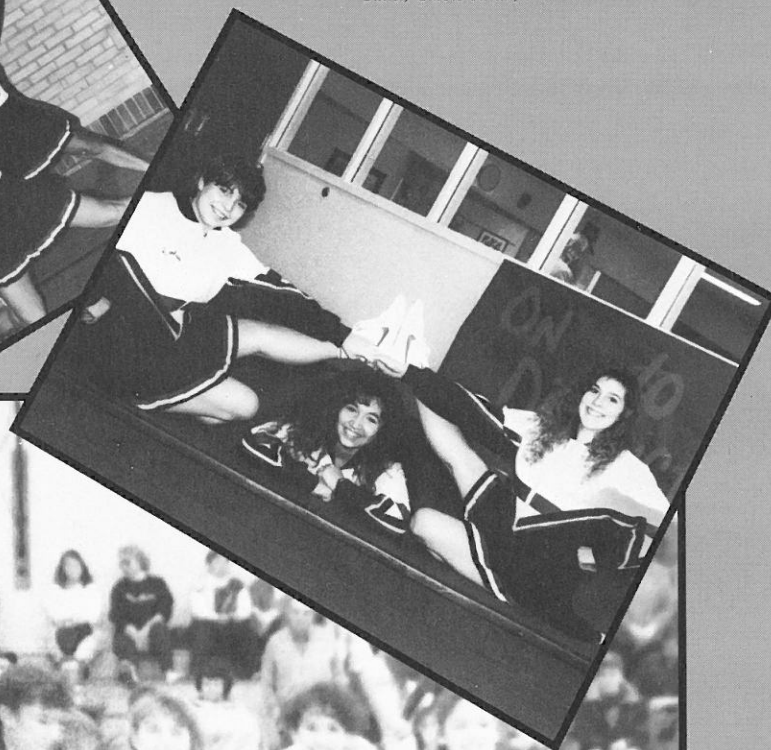

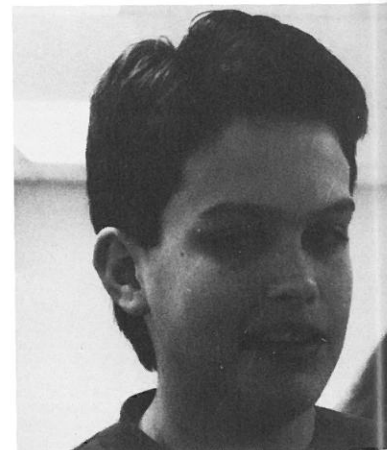

## "Magic of the Moment"

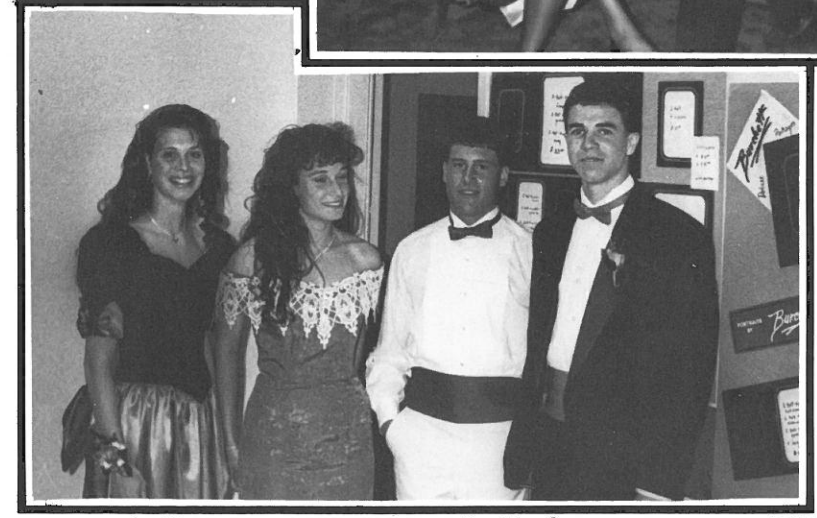

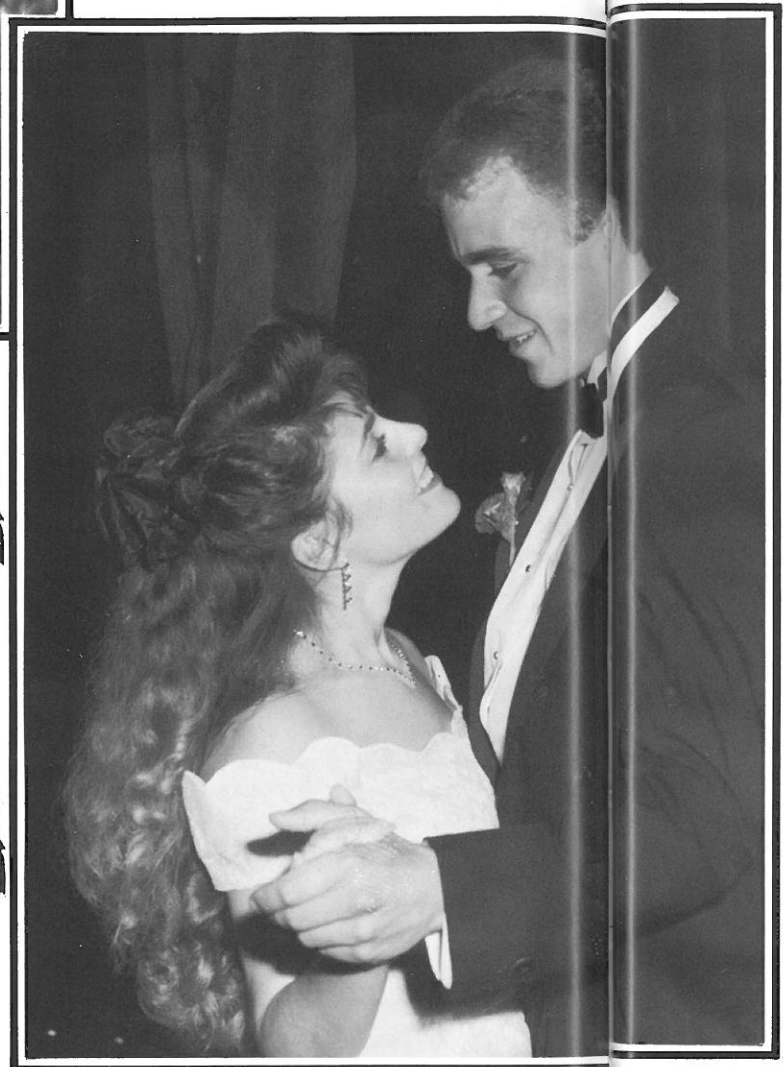

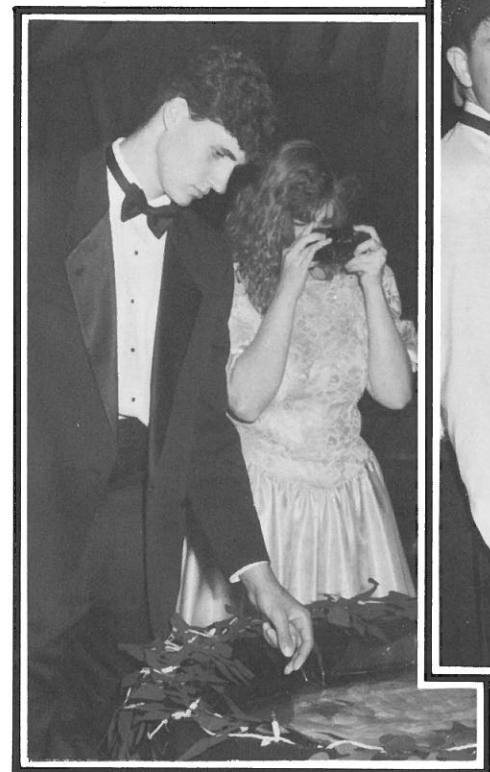

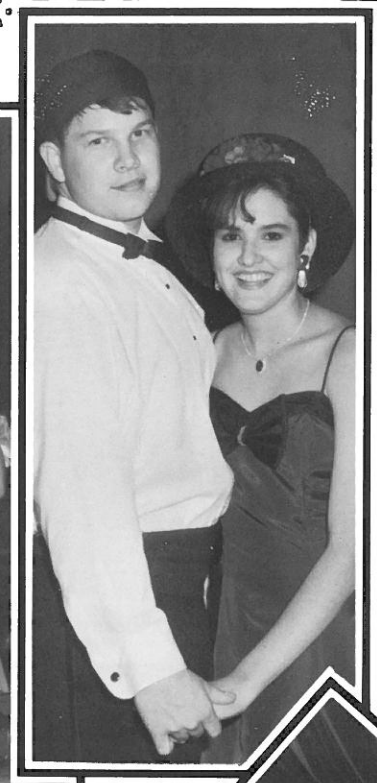

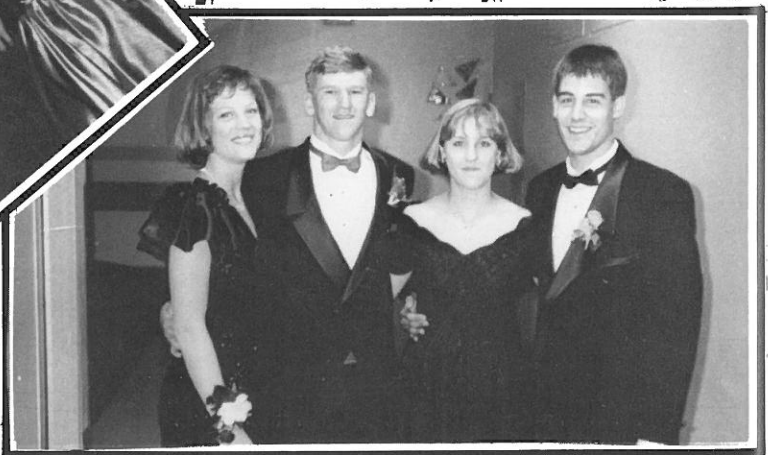

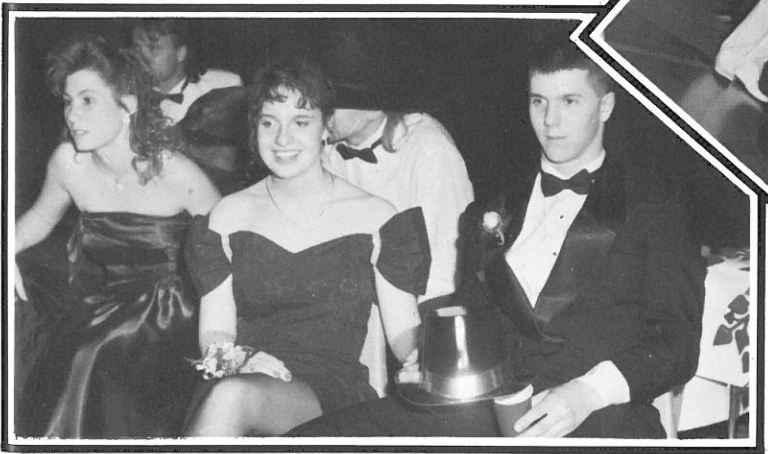

Together with the administration the faculty works hard, and they are the foundation of RHS.

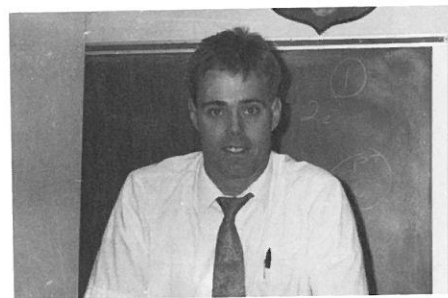
Ms. Schwisow quoted about Mr. Hammann, "I love him. He's a good reliable person, very organized, loving and supportive."
