

The freshman class of 1995 is a very large group of well-rounded students. There are 47 students in this class, 23 girls and 23 boys, and they are all active in sports and school.


















SOPHOMORES Superior in Super Ways




FFA is a program that teaches many valuable skills to those involved. Leadership and speaking contests develop quick thinking and debating skills and also instill a sense of confidence under pressure. Supervised occupational experience projects require FFA members to be responsible for records of money and receipts. Shop classes help students learn about mechanics, wood-working, and welding. This year shop members built picnic tables for the fairgrounds as a part of the "Building Our American Communities" project.

Members of FFA won first place in soils judging and traveled to Oklahoma to compete in Nationals. Livestock judging, horse judging, tractor judging, dairy judging and herdsmanship ranked very high, and members won the Sweepstakes award at the Spokane Interstate Fair. Parliamentary procedure and creed speaking teams also placed high and six members of Ritzville FFA won the State Farmer Award.

Ritzville's FFA chapter held a banquet that allowed everyone to get together and see what awards were won, the goals attained, and what positions were awarded. They also held a Dad's night that was a time to initiate Freshman Greenhands into the Chapter and present the Chapter Farmer Award to the Sophomores.

FFA members had a lot of fun aside from hard work. During the Ritzville Communities Fair they held a dance, had a bowling day during National FFA Week, and went on fishing trips. Members also went on the National Soils trip and to the State Convention. They earned these trips by being participators, gaining FFA points, by winning a first to third place in leadership contests, and by being involved in an activity such as Courtesy Corps. The Ritzville FFA chapter members work hard and have fun at the same time.





















